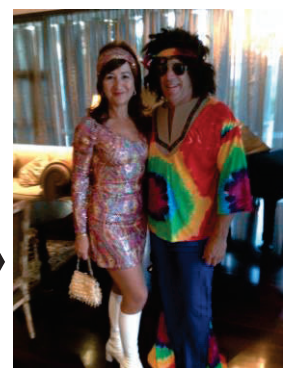

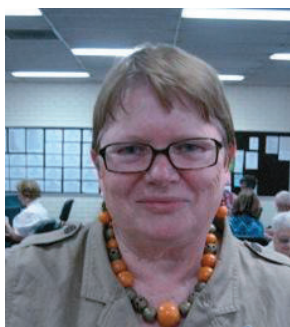

It is a red point session with set hands - \$10 per player. It is a worthy cause - come along and support it. If you can't come and play, donations are always accepted.

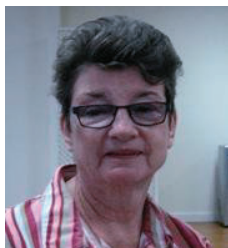

Here is one example from Andy's lesson on Opener's Rebid – Part 1

Over South's 1H response, North should rebid 1S showing four spades (and does not promise a longer diamond suit). A rebid of an unbid suit usually shows 4+ in the second suit and 5+ in the first suit, but it does not apply at the 1-level as you are just showing your major suit. Since a 1S rebid is still the cheapest-level rebid, it shows 11-17 points.

South, holding 11 points should invite to game (in case partner, North, holds 13 or more points) with a 2NT bid. As all 3 suits have been bid, the 2NT rebid should deliver a club stopper since the opponents will very likely lead a club.

North should then raise to game with 13 points. 13 is not a minimum or a maximum as it is just in the middle – so you might as well try for a game bonus!

On the C3 lead to South's C10, declarer should immediately attack hearts by playing low to dummy's HJ to East's HA. If East returns a low spade instead of the king, declarer can guarantee a spade trick regardless of the location of either spade honour.



YARBOROUGH

Named after Lord Yarborough, who back in 1827 offered odds of a shilling to a hundred guineas for anyone who could produce a hand that had no card higher than 9. We have been getting them ever since with not the faintest sign of a 100 guineas. From *"Two Old Geezers Tell You about Bridge"*.

Signals - Dawn Cullen

Dir:W Vul: N-S

After south opens the bidding 1S, which is passed out, west leads the ace of diamonds.

Looking at the diamonds visible this is very likely to be a singleton. West needs to know where the entry is in the east hand.

A suit preference signal will send this information, so play the lowest diamond.

After a club return now you would like another club

lead, so send back the next lowest diamond hoping for a ruff.

West will probably play the king of clubs on which a heart can be discarded. It is best to give a count signal on the discard.

Then on the QC lead another heart can be discarded.

Since south will have discarded a club on the second diamond lead, this will be ruffed.

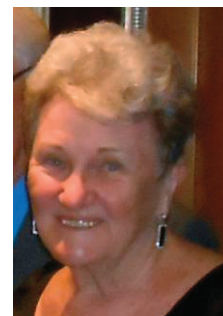
Now there is no entry to the dummy so what to do?

It seems best to lead a spade.

East can win this and lead another low diamond for a further ruff. This will use the 10 spades.

West can try another club, which enables a third heart discard but declarer can ruff in hand to overtake the queen and draw the remaining trump with the 9.

The story would have had a happier ending for defenders if east had had the 9 spades rather than the 8.
