

A Useful Splinter by Dawn Cullen

This was Board 8 on Wednesday, 26 March 2014



North opens the bidding 1D and sees a 1S response. Now that spades will be the trump suit, North and count her hand as a



five loser so game should make in spades. For even a minimum response South should have two cover cards so that leaves 3 losers.

A splinter bid of 4C promises 4 card trump support and a singleton or void in clubs with enough values for game.

This bid also suggests that there might be a slam if partner has no wasted values in clubs.

Since the South hand is a very much better than a minimum response, she should definitely head for slam. The response to RKC Blackwood shows only two keycards which is far too little for the bidding to game. Now a king ask will find one king which is still not a lot

of values.

All the top cards are present and the Q hearts looks like possibly a useful card so the Grand Slam can be bid. It is safer to bid 7 spades since a club might need to be ruffed. The subsequent play is foolproof.

Cue Bidding to Slam by Dawn Cullen

After a 1NT opening by North, the south hand suggests the possibility of a slam.

2D transfer to hearts gets a 3H response by north. This bid shows 4 hearts and a minimum hand.

A superfit is good news so now south wants to proceed towards slam.

With neither first or second round control in a suit any form of Blackwood is not a good idea. Cuebidding is the way to go to find out about the diamonds.


South bids 3S and north cooperates by bidding 4C. South now bids 5C and north with first and second round control of Diamonds, can bid 6 Hearts.

The play is very simple with only one diamond to lose, unless of course west leads a diamond and declarer is brave enough to let it run.

The Jacoby super accepts are the possible ways to make a super accept of Hearts.

There are options to show the strength of the NT hand,

maximum or not, with or without a small doubleton, all with 4 card heart support, therefore wanting to super accept the transfer.

3H 4 card support minimum

2NT 4 card support maximum no small doubleton

2S Maximum small doubleton

3C/ D Maximum small doubleton

These are bids which can be made after a 2D bid, indicating a wish to transfer to H and super accept hearts and also better describe the NT opening.

The 2S, 3C/3D options show maximum NT hands with a small doubleton in the bid suit.

What is Winter Retreat?

This is purely a fun, social weekend with no organised events or competitive tournaments (well...except for the Magic:the Gathering Grand Melee, the Ultimate Werewolf evening and the huge game of Twilight Imperium!).

Current turnout is around 50+ people. Everyone is welcome - the kids have a great time!

WHAT USUALLY HAPPENS?

The camp is available to use from 2 pm on Friday. Many people take the day off from work and arrive sometime that afternoon. Others travel up after work and get there around 8pm. There is the opportunity to car pool if you haven't got transport. You stay at the facility until 3 pm on the Sunday and then head on back home.

In between is a whole lot of gaming, especially those longer games you don't often get time for (e.g. Twilight Imperium). There are also some popular 'parlour' games for large groups (e.g. Ultimate Werewolf). As well as gaming there is usually a pilgrimage to the local tourist traps.

All meals are included in the price:

- afternoon tea and dinner on Friday
- breakfast/morning tea/lunch/afternoon tea/dinner on Saturday
- breakfast/morning tea/lunch on Sunday/

There is also bottomless tea/coffee/juice/pre-mixed cordial. If you have special dietary requirements they can be catered for.

ACCOMMODATION

The camp has a number of cabins - usually 2 bed or family cabins that cater for 4 -6 people. All cabins have their own has shower and toilet facilities. You need to bring pillows, warm blankets, towels and toiletries (and games of course!).

Protect Yourself

The more I understand about the rules of bridge, the better I am able to protect myself from apparent disadvantage.

The Novice Pairs at the Gold Coast Congress were on the clock and at one stage my partner and I waited for a considerable amount of time for our opponents to appear. Apparently, at this point we should have alerted a director to be aware of the possibility of being disadvantaged through no fault of our own. On the final board we could have made 6D although no other pairs bid above 5D (for 71%); however, the director appeared before our bidding started and allocated an average for the board.

This is probably one of the situations that Jan refers to below when there are too many possible outcomes to reasonably calculate an assigned score. Our opponents could just as easily been late through no fault of their own having been delayed starting their previous round.

Adjusted Scores

There are two types of score adjustment when a result is affected by a breach of the Laws: Assigned Adjusted Scores and Artificial Adjusted Scores.

If a board can be played, then the preference is always to award an Assigned Adjusted Score which is a real bridge score eg 4S making 10 tricks. An assigned score may be weighted eg 70% of 4S (10) and 30% of 4S (9) to reflect various possible without outcomes the infraction. Assigned Scores may also be split with different contracts/outcomes to NS and EW eg NS might be awarded 4S (10) and EW might get 5D W (10). Another option is for scores to be both weighted and split ;-)

When а score cannot be the director obtained. awards an artificial adjusted score of 40%, 50% or 60% depending on responsibility for the board being unplayable. In rare situations an artificial score may be awarded when there are too many possible outcomes to reasonably calculate an assigned score.

Say 9 tables are playing 9 rounds of matchpoint pairs (an everyday bridge session). 16 matchpoints are awarded to a pair that beats every other pair on a board. 40% (Average Minus) is 6.4 mps; 50% (Average) is 8 mps and 60% (Average Plus) is 9.6 mps.

Pairs awarded 40% and 60% will have these artificial scores further adjusted if their session average is lower or higher respectively. Say the 40% pair is having a really bad day and average 33% on the other boards. They get 33% not 40% on the problem board. Likewise, if the 60% pair average 64% then they get 64% for this board as well. 50% remains 50% regardless of the session average.

Playing in an event scored by imps with matches of fewer than 11 boards eg teams or butler pairs, Ave+ is +2 imp and Ave- is -2 imp.
