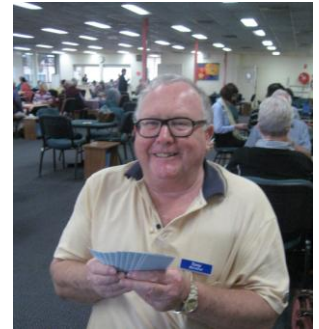

A Worthy Cause

*Isabella Bevan is Carmel Martin's sister. Below is an **extract** from a letter from Isabella about her most recent charity.*

My name is Isabella Bevan and I recently read an article on women's shelters that outlined the plight of mothers and their children arriving at refuges with only the clothes they stand in.

Ozcare is a not-for-profit organisation which provides a wide range of health and community services across Queensland. The organisation has five domestic and family violence refuges in Brisbane alone, where they provide safe and secure short term accommodation to women and children affected by domestic violence. I am hoping to organise donations of essential school items, such as school bags, stationery, socks, school shoes, polo shirts etc. The aim of this support is to help these families make the transition from homelessness to self-sufficiency.

So far a bag supplier has generously donated 250 school bags. The next aim is to provide 250 pencil cases containing pencils, erasers, coloured pencil packs, rulers, sharpeners (barrel), blue and red biros, glue sticks and school scissors (round edged).

I am also looking for donations of white school socks, sizes 13-2 and 2-8.

Improving players should find **No Trump Contracts** (2003) by **David Bird** very rewarding. It is clear and comprehensive, comprising twelve chapters following the pattern: discussion, examples, summary of points to remember and then hands to test yourself.

The chapters cover planning the play, holding up, finessing and ducking into the safe hand, playing Ace-Queen combinations, maintaining entries, disguising your strength, the throw-in and counting defenders' shape.

Chapter eleven deals with the throw-in. The following aspects are covered:

- Relying on assistance
- Forcing the discard of winners

Under Points to Remember this advice is listed:

- To execute a throw-in, you must remove any safe exit cards that the key defender holds.
- To leave yourself with a throw-in card, you may need to win the second round from a stopper of Axx in the suit led.
- When a defender holds too many winners alongside his xx (or Qxx)' play winners of your own to put him to a critical discard.

The bidding for the following hand:

West leads his SK against 3NT. You duck the first round and West continues with the SQ, East completing a high-low signal to indicate he holds two cards in the suit. There would be little point in a second hold-up since East is unlikely to gain the lead. You win the second spade, retaining the option of throwing West on lead with the S !0 at a later stage. What now?

You can count eight top tricks if the diamonds come in. The only realistic chance of a ninth trick is to score dummy's CQ. You cannot do this if East holds the CK sitting over the queen. Nor is it obvious how you can score a club trick if West holds the CK.

You will have to remove all of West's red-suit cards first, otherwise he would have a safe exit in one of those suits.

When you play on diamonds, the suit breaks and West shows up with three cards in the suit. On the fourth round he throws the H5. The HA drops West's HQ and leaves these cards still to be played:

The key moment has been reached. You play a heart to your king and turn to watch West's reaction. He is not a happy man. In order to retain a guard on the CK he has to throw one of his spade winners. Since he has only three winners remaining (and one trick already scored, the spade that you ducked at Trick 1), it is safe to throw him on lead. West cashes three spades and then has to lead away from the CK. You rise with dummy's queen and claim the contract when this card holds.

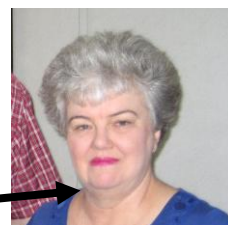

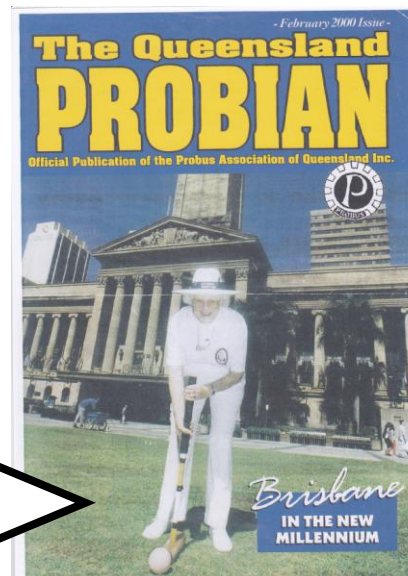

After having very few values in the previous matches East could not believe his luck to pick up this lovely balanced 24 count. The bidding went 2C - (P) - 2D waiting.

Now a 2NT rebid shows a balanced 23 – 24 point hand. (This is better than 2 spades which should be an unbalanced hand and usually a 6 card suit.)



This is the type of hand that Puppet Stayman was developed to investigate.

On this particular hand a transfer to hearts is the appropriate bid.

It is usually not good for the weaker hand to ask for key cards but this time West has no option.

With 8 HCP and a good 5 card suit opposite a balanced 23 then slam must be a possibility.

4 NT would be RKC in hearts. After finding out that all 4 aces are there, an asking bid for the Q of hearts is useful.

If the partnership uses 4NT as quantitative then 4C would be Gerber.

5 NT shows that all the keycards are held and asks about kings. When only one is present, the slam is going to depend on one of two finesses so West can bid 6 NT. It is a great advantage to have the opening lead come up to the strong hand.

A lead of a minor suit from the south hand is likely to be helpful. **If a spade is led east must be careful to win in his hand to preserve the only entry to the west hand.** There are finesse possibilities in both minor suits.

First east can test the possibility of a 3 – 3 break in the heart suit although this only happens about 1/3 of the time. Unblock the A and Q of hearts and then use the only entry to dummy Q S to test the heart suit.

This time fortune favours the brave and 5 heart tricks are available. Discards will be helpful in deciding which minor suit to finesse after a spade lead.

It all works terribly well since both minor kings are in the north hand and the spade suit breaks 3 – 3. This is very lucky and the result is that 13 tricks are available, with one finesse in a minor.

Kate's Rules to Live by: No. 13

Bid Your Long Suits – don't make a takeout double.
