## **Director's Corner**

#### **Bidding Boxes**

Some recent overseas cases of cheating centred around the way players positioned their playing cards. It is most important to use bidding cards in a uniform manner to avoid any problems.

Players should not touch any bidding card before they have determined their call.

There is no such call as tapping the table.

Pass Cards are best not kept on the table ready for use. The process is that one selects a card from the bidding box at each turn. Sliding a Pass Card a few inches from your cache is not so easily seen and may lead to delays.

Bidding cards are placed on the table so that they neatly overlap, but not hide, any previous call. They are not tossed from 20 cm above the table to see how far they will scatter.

All Bidding cards should remain on the table until after the opening lead has been faced. A player who removes his bidding cards from the table with the intention of passing is deemed to have passed.

There is a process to follow in alerting:

- The partner of the player who has made an alertable call **audibly** says, "Alert," and
- places an Alert Card across the bidding card designating the call being alerted.
- The opponent being alerted must acknowledge the alert before calling.

## **Save Time at Every Opportunity**

The Laws do not say, "After a bid, double or redouble has been followed by three passes in rotation, the Defender on presumed Declarer's left writes the contract onto his personal record sheet before making the opening lead face down".

Nor do they say, "After the opening lead is faced, and after the contract is entered into the Bridgemate, Dummy spreads his hand in front of him on the table."

Keep the game moving. Make the opening lead and display the Dummy first. Ideally, all the peripheral stuff will be done at the end of the hand though players seem to have more difficulty these days in remembering both the contract and the opening lead. There may also be disputes with bidding boxes as to what the contract really was and whether it was doubled.

Players are not permitted aids to memory so do consider whether writing down the opening lead at the start of the play helps you to remember it. Keep the information on your personal record sheet hidden from opponents. This means don't leave sheets face up on the table and be mindful of prying eyes when writing on them.



# Mike Pemberton and Splergen - a Tribute and a Legacy

As a mathematician and retired member of staff of the Department of Mathematics at the University of Queensland, Mike was also a bidding theorist. Prior to falling ill, Mike had planned to publish an article about a convention he had himself invented, "Splergen." He and I played it together successfully for some years and found it to produce many excellent results.

As the name suggests, Splergen is a combination of Splinter and Bergen. However, it is more than just this since it also incorporates Jacoby!

So how does Splergen work? Firstly, it only operates when Opener bids a major and Responder has exactly 4-card support.

## Opening bid of 1 4

Let's start with an opening bid of 1 ♠. Here is what Responder bids:

- With 0-6 HCP, she responds 3 ♠ ("Bergen")
- With a ♣ Splinter or 7-8 or 9-10 HCP, she responds 2 NT ("Splinter or Bergen")
- With 11+ HCP, she responds 3 ♣ ("Bergen" / "Jacoby")

If Opener hears a 2 NT response, he relays 3  $\clubsuit$ . Responder now replies as follows: 3  $\blacklozenge$  =  $\clubsuit$  Splinter, 3  $\blacktriangledown$  = 7-8 HCP, 3  $\spadesuit$  = 9-10 HCP. If Responder has 7-10 HCP and a Splinter in another suit, she simply bids the Splinter. Example: 1  $\spadesuit$  - 3  $\blacklozenge$  or 1  $\spadesuit$  - 3  $\blacktriangledown$ .

Opener can now generally place the contract correctly in 3 o or 4 . However, if he wishes to know more, he asks for Key Cards (KC) via the cheapest bid available. If the response were 3 o, then 3 o from Opener would ask for the number of KC held, KC values being A = 2, K = 1.

The response is up the line: Step 1 = 0 or 1, Step 2 = 2 etc. If Opener required further information, he would ask via the next cheapest non-trump bid for the Q of trumps. If he held this himself, he would skip this level and go to the next cheapest bid to request further information.

Here is an example:

♠ AKTxxx	<b>♠</b> Qxxx
<b>▼</b> A	▼ xxxx
♦ AQx	♦ Kxx
♣ Qxx	<b>♣</b> Kx
Bidding	
1 •	2 NT ♣ Splinter or 7-8 or 9-10 HCP
3 ♣ Which of the options do you have?	3 ♥ The first HCP range (7-8 HCP)

At this point, opener would usually place the contract in  $3 \triangleq$  (if a minimum were held) or  $4 \triangleq$  if he considered that game would make. In this case, however, he realizes that despite the relatively low point count for slam, his hand is worthy of further inquiry.

After Responder's 3 , he therefore bids 3 NT, a request for Key Cards (KC). The bidding would then continue as follows:

3 NT (omitting 3 ♠, which would be to play)	4 ◆ 2 KC (each King being worth 1)
6♠	

Now let's see what happens if Opener hears a 3 ♣ response after 1 ♠. His pulse is bound to quicken as this is the Game or Game+ response. He answers as follows:

- 3 = 17 + HCP and a shortage
- 3 = 17 + HCP and no shortage
- 3 ♠ = 11-13 HCP
- 4 ♠ = 14-16 HCP

If Responder hears the most exciting answer from Opener (3 •), she relays with the next available bid to ask for the suit in which the shortage is held.

Example:  $1 - 3 - 3 - 3 \cdot (17 + \text{HCP and a shortage}) - 3 \cdot (\text{Where is your shortage?}) - 3 \cdot (\text{in Clubs})$  or 3 NT (in Diamonds) or  $4 \cdot (\text{in Hearts})$ .

## Opening bid of 1 🔻

Now it's time to look at an opening bid of  $1 \checkmark$ . The responses are the same as for  $1 \diamondsuit$ , with the major exception that 2 NT shows the 11+ HCP Game Force hand whilst  $2 \diamondsuit$  shows either a  $\diamondsuit$  Splinter, 7-8 HCP or 9-10 HCP. The cheapest bids available are used as inquiries. Again, Splinters in suits other than  $\diamondsuit$  ( $\diamondsuit$  and  $\diamondsuit$ ), are indicated simply via  $1 \lor - 3 \diamondsuit$  or  $1 \lor - 3 \diamondsuit$ .

Also worth noting is that the system applies over an opposition Double or if Responder has previously passed. Example:  $p - (p) - 1 - (p \text{ or } X) - 2 \text{ NT or } 3 - (p \text{ or } X) - 2 \text{ NT or } 3 - (p \text{ or } X) - (p \text{$ 

## **Examples**

(\*) The first step available that is not trumps asks if partner holds the trump Q. If the inquirer held the Q herself, she would use the step above this as an asking bid (relay +1). In this case, she does not hold the Q, so she asks for it via the first relay. The replies are as follows:

- If no trump Q is held, the answer is the lowest trump bid available
- If just the Q is held, the reply is the lowest NT available (In this case, 5 NT)
- If the Q and at least one King is held, the response is the lowest suit where the King is held. In this case 6 ♦.
- (If no trump Q is held but there is still an outside king, this can be uncovered via the next relay bid from inquirer).
